You may have seen school inspectors have observing different classrooms back in November. They even watched our playtimes and lunchtimes. Well, after a six-plus week wait, we got the results we were waiting for. We were upgraded to good, with our early years provision ranked outstanding, and guess what, the *Harbinger Chronicles* was one of the reasons.



What is it like to attend this school?

Leaders have developed a welcoming culture in the school. Staff know their pupils extremely well. Working relationships between staff and pupils are very positive. Pupils feel a strong sense of community. They are happy, safe and feel valued.

There are high expectations for all pupils, including pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND). This includes in early years where there are no limits or barriers to children's achievements. Pupils are enthusiastic, kind and enjoy learning.

Pupils are well behaved during lessons and around the school site. They help to support positive behaviour in the school through roles including anti-bullying ambassadors and playground buddies. In early years, children are highly motival and demonstrate high levels of self-control.

All pupils in the school attend a range of outings every year which help to widen pupils' cultural experiences. These include visits to museums, galleries and places of worship. Pupils also have the opportunities to develop their leadership skills through groups including the student council, eco leaders and writing for the school paper, the 'Harbinger Chronicle'.




Sabrina: I don't think that you should hit someone back because you might get in a lot of trouble if you're at home or school and you and that person might become enemies.



But that was last year, now it's this year! Let's continue the story of the tragic death of the two fishes.


Jeanette brought new goldfish but guess what? They killed the poor fish which was there before them! How rude? I know they're fish, but it's still rude, all fish should be treated equally!


Key stage one participated in a workshop about Legos to develop their creativity. You might be thinking "that's not fair," well it is.


They had to combine an animal and a building, and then build it with Lego's! How fun? They put a little map under it, which has streets, bushes and so much more!





As you must know by now, there has been conflict in the Middle East. Palestine and Israel are at war.


Half of the people in Palestine are children so it's really unfair for them to have to suffer because of war.
