

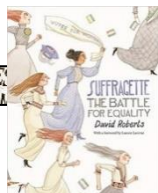
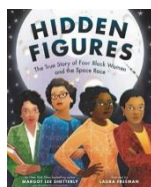
English

Children will...

- Read a variety of fiction and non-fiction, seen and unseen texts and answer comprehension questions
- Understand the purpose and audience of different writing genres
- Plan and write for a variety of purposes, focusing on memoirs and a persuasive campaign
- Learn and apply a range of age-expected grammar and spelling techniques
- Improve the legibility of their handwriting
- Proofread, edit, and re-draft their writing

- Reflect on work and learning

 use form and texture to reflect abstract concepts.
 create carved, relief, and free-standing Modernist sculptures.

Maths

Children will:

- Multiply and divide whole numbers by 10, 100 and 1000
- Know and use the vocabulary of prime numbers, prime factors and composite (non-prime) numbers
- Know and use the vocabulary of square and cubed numbers
- Add and subtract fractions with different denominators
- Convert improper fractions and mixed numbers
- Add and subtract mixed numbers and fractions

- Review their web page

History

Children will...

- Explore the **Big Question**: What lasting impact did the Anglo Saxons have on Britain?
- Discuss and understand the meaning of the terms 'invaders' and 'settlers'.
- Understand how groups of Anglo-Saxons decided where to start settlements in Britain by considering both the local environment and the wider environment
- Appreciate the different jobs and leisure activities of the Anglo-Saxons
- Understand the role and appearance of an Anglo-Saxon warrior
- Understand that the Roman Empire had brought Christianity to pagan Britannia in the 3rd century.
- Understand how Christianity evolved in Britain
- Appreciate the importance of Sutton Hoo and discuss what the items buried in the grave tell us about the person

So that they...

understand how people's lives have shaped Britain
 gain historical perspective by understanding the connections between local and

Science

Children will:

- Describe the Sun, Earth and Moon as approximately spherical bodies by understanding how this knowledge has been attained.
- Describe the movement of the Moon relative to the Earth by explaining how the Moon orbits the Earth.
- Describe the movement of the Earth, and other planets, relative to the Sun in the solar system by learning the order of the planets and how they move in the solar system.
- Explain day and night and the apparent movement of the Sun across the sky by examining why the sun appears to move and the arguments for the Earth's rotation.
- Explain day and night and the apparent movement of the Sun across the sky by predicting night and day in different places on Earth.

So that they...

understand the movement of the Earth, and other planets, relative to the Sun in the solar system.
 understand the movement of the Moon relative to the Earth.
 understand the Sun, Earth and Moon as approximately spherical bodies.
 use the idea of the Earth's rotation to explain day and night and the apparent movement of the Sun across the sky.

RE

Children will:

- Explore the **BIG QUESTION**:
 What would Jesus do? Can we live by the values of Jesus in the twenty-first century?

So that they...

outline Jesus' teaching on how his followers should live
 explain the impact Jesus' example and teachings might have on Christians today
 express their own understanding of what Jesus would do in relation to a moral dilemma from the world today
